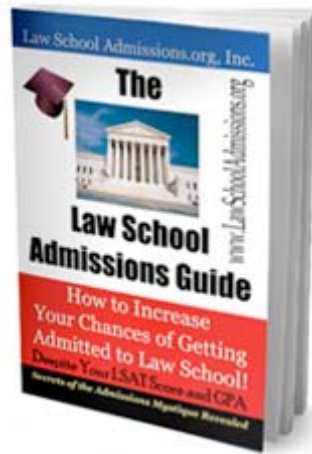

Introduction

There are few statements as prophetic as that from Professor David Wilkins:

Congratulations on your acceptance to Harvard. You've won the lottery! You are now guaranteed access to the good life. If you are worried about failing at Harvard, don't be. *Time passes and so will you.*

This quote in *How to Get into Harvard Law School*, written by Willie J. Epps, Jr., gave me confidence in my pursuit of a law degree, and I hope it does the same for you. If you purchased this *Guide*, you are standing where I was not too long ago. I wanted to go to law school. The process seemed daunting, somewhat archaic and I did not know where to get answers to my questions about the law school application process. I looked for advice in every direction. I spoke to students who I knew were in law school, as well as to guidance counselors, professors, administrators and basically anyone who I thought could give me sound advice on what course of action I needed to take to get into law school.

After reading his book, I spoke with and became friends with Willie. I spoke with and asked for advice from Richard Montauk, author of *How to Get into the Top Law Schools*, *How to Get Into the Top MBA Programs* and *How to Get into the Top Colleges*. Mr. Montauk and I happened to be taking the same class together at Harvard. There are not many books that specifically offer advice on the law school application process. Before I applied to law school, by speaking with these authors, I had already sought out advice from two of the best. Basically, I was willing to do whatever work and consult with whomever necessary to figure out and learn what I needed to do to get accepted to the law school of my choice. Providing law school applicants with my acquired insight is the purpose behind this *Guide*.

I was fortunate to have such passion about attending law school, for I realize just how much of an advantage understanding the law gives an individual. It is understandable why ethics in the law is of such importance. No other profession enables a person to help others the way the law does. In no other profession do you literally have people's life, liberty, property and justice under your fiduciary protection. There is a limitless ability to influence society and help those around you when you understand and can apply the law.

As a lawyer, you learn the art of problem solving, which is a perspective I never saw before entering law school. Although I was always good with problematic issues, the law school experience taught me the art of refining the issues and multiple-problem resolution. Law school most definitely changes the way you think. You see the world through different eyes and you evaluate and solve problems differently.

My experience applying to law school taught me many lessons. I have written this *Guide* as a way to pass on to others the information and lessons I learned as a law school applicant about the law school application process. It is my intention to provide information in a short and concise manner, getting right to the point. I have included information learned from my experience and the information I feel will help you increase your chances of getting accepted. Some critical information is purposely repeated, in order that the point not be missed.

I truly believe that the information contained within this *Guide* is invaluable. The insight and perspective I acquired from my experience should not be underestimated; the information I have chosen to include in this *Guide* is considered by me to be critical to a successful application

process. Pay special attention to the information regarding letters of recommendation, resumes and residency because they may become the determining factors as to whether you are admitted. It is important however, to understand that although they may become determining factors, in most all cases, they are not the first factor considered for most law school admission. The information contained within this *Guide* is intended to set the record straight, simple and straightforward. It was not until I had gone through the application process that I learned what was truly important and pivotal, and what was not.

A retrospective vision is always the clearest. It is my intention to provide you with my perspective so that you may benefit now before you apply to law school from the lessons I was only able to piece together in hindsight. Fortunately, I somehow kept doing the right think, and this is what I pass along to you.

In applying to law school, I can readily tell you that I was aggressive, thorough and determined to be admitted to the school of my choice. Through it all, I gained unique insight on the admissions process. I had heard the sad tale of so many rejections, as I am sure you have. For example, taking no chances, I applied to 18 law schools. At the same time, my close friend applied to the same 18 law schools while, and an additional 16, totaling 34 schools to which he applied. Combined, there were 52 law school applications between us to complete, and also compare. Luckily, I was admitted to the law school of my first choice. Applying to this many schools gave us a unique perspective by being able to compare the responses we received from the various schools, taking consideration the variances in our applications and credentials. We obtained a perspective which is unavailable to most students who are applying to law school.

Through comparison, important perspectives began to emerge, such as the extreme emphasis law school admissions committees place on Index scores and the importance some schools place on residency. I elaborate on these discoveries within this *Guide*. Many of the perspectives I share with you would not have been observable had my close friend and I not both (1) applied to so many schools, (2) applied to the same schools, (3) been able to compare the success of our applications and the timing of our acceptance letters and (4) communicated directly with numerous law school deans.

Some approaches discussed in this book are unconventional and may be acceptable criticized by some, but they also may be the very approach needed by some applicants to get their applications noticed. Every person is different and each person must individually assess his or her own application status and needs—i.e. weaknesses. At least in reading *The Law School Admissions Guide* you have the knowledge to make your own informed decisions.
